## Logistics

- Each event is an approximately 2.5-hour event. Breakfast and networking begins at 8:30. The orientation will begin at 8:45.
- In total, six career events will take place over the school year.
- Volunteers will spend most of their time in a classroom interacting directly with 20-30 students.
- Sessions will follow either panel discussions or roundtable formats, where volunteers will converse with small groups of students.
- There will be one teacher in classroom who will assist with any logistics and questions.
- Student ambassadors will assist volunteers throughout the event.
- Remember that our students identify as different genders. To respect their gender identities, we kindly ask that you refer to them as students instead of “girls” or “ladies.”
- Please keep all conversations appropriate and applicable to the topic at hand.

## Opportunities to share what you do

- Feel free to bring a presentation that does not require internet access on your personal device or printed.
- Bring a photo book from college or work.
- Bring something you’ve created: book/portfolio/artwork/anything!
- Show off an object from your job that represents what you do.
- Remember that students may not use the jargon or language you use daily. Take a moment to explain what certain words/terms mean.
- Do a quick game, activity, or role-play for about a minute. It could represent something you do regularly or have a few students act out what they think you do at work.
- Keep it interactive: Do a quick trivia round about facts from your career field. Students enjoy this. Give candy to those who answer correctly.
